Budget Talks Update

Senate President Pro Tem Phil Berger (R-Rockingham/Caswell/ Surry/Stokes) and Speaker Tim Moore (R-Cleveland) continue final budget negotiations with Governor Roy Cooper.

General Assembly leaders sent to the Governor a <u>\$25.7 billion</u> <u>budget proposal</u> in late September. The spending plan was not released to the public.

The state has not operated under a full budget since 2018, but has passed mini budgets, which are not all encompassing.

Legislative leaders have been at an impasse in recent years on teacher pay, Medicaid, tax policy, and other priorities.

NCAABCB lobbyists are monitoring two provisions that were included in the House version of the budget.

House budget writers proposed raising Clerks of Courts salaries, which are the statutory maximum for general managers unless there is appointing authority approval.

The House budget also allocates funds for roof replacement, warehouse office renovations, and warehouse storage at the ABC Commission.

A final state budget agreement is expected within weeks. Follow this story on <u>NCAABCB Twitter</u>.
